


Free mystery dinner theater scripts

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From the beginning on local Minnesota television, the Mystery Science Theater 3000 has become one of the funniest shows on television. Thanks to a dedicated fan base, constantly sharing episode tapes, MST3K remained on the air for 10 seasons, airing on The Comedy Channel, Comedy Central and Sci-Fi Channel. It got a Netflix reboot in 2017, but it lasted only two seasons. Before watching netflix episodes, sink your teeth into these 12 episodes. While the entire series is worth watching, 10 years of television pre-rebooting is a lot to ask someone to sit through. In addition to having a good time, these episodes will introduce you to some recurring jokes. There are a lot of them. (Most of the MST3K catalog is included in the Shout! Factory TV subscription list on Amazon for \$2.99 per month.)

1. Side Hackers First Season of Mystery Science Theater 3000 is a little slow. The show was still trying to find its voice. The riffs were easier, allowing movies to fail for themselves a little more. The chemistry between Joel and the bots wasn't there either. It was still a fun show, but the first season didn't hold up to what the series had become. Side Hackers, episode 2 of Season 2, where the show found its voice. Joel finds a line between being a parent of bots and joining in the fun. The host segments are among the funniest of the series since Side Hacking Song is one of the funniest music segments of the host series. The film itself is the darkest, most unpleasant piece of crap ever featured on the show. It was added to the season before the writers finished watching it all. The uncircumcised film includes a gruesome rape/murder scene that was edited out of the film for the episode, as it was too late to give it up altogether. From this film, the writers had to watch the film in its entirety before deciding to use it on the show. Despite the heavy end, the rest of the film is the funniest, stupidest kind of thing ever put on screen. Each character is absolutely despicable and incredibly stupid. Fake Sports Sidehacking involves hanging from a motorcycle stroller. Riffs during racing scenes are some of the funniest series. Even Cambot gets one in, imposing an ESPN-style Bordeaux vs. movie box score over the action. Boredom goes far ahead.
2. Pod People It Stinks! It's not just the exact description of the film, it becomes a running joke that almost lasts the rest of the series. This comes from a scene where a group of teenage musicians record a song with incomprehensible lyrics. After they're done, the singers will ask the band leader what he thinks. He tossed the sign OK and says: It stinks. Later, Joel and Bots recreate the scene with their own version of the song, and Joel provides a line. A classic joke is born. The rest of the film is a confusing mess. It's so bad; Tom Servo actually apologizes for the plot. It was originally assumed that about evil alien invaders. After the success of E.T., the film's writers were ordered to change the script at the last minute. The story of a friendly alien, having friends with a little boy, was added, and the boy feels hasty. Since the movie is so bad, riffs, that's much funnier. Alien forces don't make any sense, leading to a hen-inducing line: Trumps, you can do stupid things! From Joel. Pod People is one of the best episodes of the series, but the birth of one of the best running gags MST3K is the real reason to watch this.
3. Santa Claus conquers the Martians The 21st episode of Season 3 was the first Christmas episode of MST3K. Santa Claus conquers the Martians - a strange, camp children's film about a group of Martians who want to capture Santa Claus for their children. Starring an astonished Martian named Kimar and a wacky lazy Martian named Dropo. They kidnap a particularly fixated Santa Claus along with a couple of earthly children. On Mars, Santa builds a workshop to create a toy and, dealing with a militant Martian to kill them, make a new Santa Dropo Mars. It's the cheesiest cheesy movie whose comedy attempts are falling so flat, with Joel and the bots there's a must. The jokes about how Santa's whim borders on intoxication in the film are especially great. This episode also has the best musical host segment in the history of the series. After a tangent about the movie Roadhouse, Crowe composes a song by Patrick Swayze Christmas. It is the only Christmas song in existence that contains a sequence of actions. And yes, I play every year.
4. Manos: Hands of Destiny's 24th episode of season four features the absolutely worst movie Joel and the bots ever exposed to too. On a technical level, this is the worst film ever shown on a series, which is an achievement. The film is so bad it should be taught in film schools as a perfect example of what not to do when you make a movie. Written by a fertilizer seller in 1966, Manos: Hands of Destiny about a family on a road trip that remain in a strange house is usually still a stranger. Torgo, who tends to the house while the host is away, limps around the house and mutters his lines in an offputting (for the wrong reason) voice. Much of the dialogue sounds wrong, since all the audio in this film was recorded in post-production. An early scene between a father and a cop has the same actor recording both parts. The rest of the film is full of strange cuts and awful walk. Naturally, such a horrible movie leads to some of the best comments from Joel and the bots. Most of them come at the expense of the film's awful pace. At some point, it drives Joel crazy enough to pounce. In an extended scene where Torgo wakes up and nothing happens, Joel breaks down. Do something! God! 5. Ega! Beware of snakes! Here's another line that has become a lasting presence for the rest of the series. Joel and the bots exposed the film about several who encounter a caveman in the middle of nowhere. The famous line comes from a scene where a girl who first encountered a caveman leads her father and friend into the desert to look for him. When the father leaves, the string of Beware snakes! seems to come out of nowhere. No mouth moves; it doesn't come from any direction, it's just embarrassing to call in Joel's in, and the bots will keep repeating the line whenever it seemed appropriate in future movies. The film itself is strange, meaningless and incompetently made. Perfect for MST3K treatment. Joel and the bots get a lot of mileage from Arch Hall jr.s star... strange looks. It seems painful to be the most accurate comment ever made on the show. There's also some not-so-family chemistry between father and daughter that makes everything fun uncomfortable.
6. Mitchell's 12th episode of season five is notable for being Joel's last episode and the introduction of Mike Nelson as the new host. Mads hire a new pace that gets on your nerves immediately. In a 2001 parody scene: A Space Odyssey, Gypsy reads Mads lips while discussing how to fire Mike. Thinking they're talking about Joel's murder, Gypsy activates the escape capsule and sends Joel back to Earth. Since Madam needs a new test subject, they can't fire Mike anymore. Instead, they ask what size jumpsuit he wears. According to the theme song after this episode, they then conked it on the noggin and shot it into space. The film they're watching is proof that even an anthero cop movie can be boring. A lot of great riffs come from the fact that Mitchell is the most sluggish, slowest cop movie anyone has ever seen. This movie is also home to the least exciting car chase you'll ever watch. Even the accompanying music is boring. Star Joe Don Baker reportedly hated the fact that MST3K ridiculed the film. His hostility toward treatment led the show to later feature another Baker car and launch even more vicious insults against the actor. Mike Nelson later stated that Baker was more outraged by being asked about the episode than the episode itself. Either way, the fact that a TV episode made an actor that crazy automatically makes it a must-watch.
7. Santa Claus MST3K another

Christmas episode is a classic for completely different reasons than Santa Claus conquers the Martians. For the 21st episode of Season 5, Mike and the Bots watch the nightmare-inducing Mexican classic, Santa Claus. In this film, Santa lives in a castle in space, where children from all over the world make toys for him. He rides deer robots that will chase your dreams forever. Throughout the film, he is hindered by a demon named Pitch, who wants to turn good children into bad ones. He tries several different and incomprehensible methods, including pushing the chimney at a couple of feet. not very effective. Santa is also the slowest Santa Claus in any movie. In B He can't visit more than four children all night. The host segments, as in the last episode of Christmas, are all pretty big too. Particularly politically correct festive anthem: Merry Christmas.... If that's ok. Also, this episode contains some references to Mitchell, so it's good that you watched that one too. 8. Cosmic mutiny Now we are firmly in the sci-fi channel era where Mike and the bots are held captive by Dr. Forrester's mother, Pearl. This time, they are exposed to Star Wars heist with battle scenes pulled straight from the 1978 Battlestar Galactica series. Unfortunately, the writers don't realize that until the episode airs. However, the film is the campiest 80s-looking thing modern TVs are capable of displaying. Get ready for big hair and big soft suits. There is only so much to make fun of here; it made this episode one of the funniest of the series. From jokes about how everyone dies after falling from fences, to the alternate names of the bulky hero Dave Ryder. Slap Bulkhead, Bigmeat Fridge, and Big McLargeHuge are a few favorites. This episode also has bots ragging at Mike for being nostalgic for the 1980s, a decade that, if this movie is anything to go by, completely sucked. 9. Time Chasers Is probably one of the most popular films the crew of The Companion of Love has to sit through. Time Chasers was made in 1994, but you'll never know it. With all the pink shirts and shoulder pads, I could have sworn it was an 80s movie. or both) is that the main characters travel to the future and all fashions are the same as when they are gone. The hero of the film is also incredibly wimpy looking for an action movie. One of the funniest parts of the episode involves the hosts' disbelief that Matthew Bruch is actually the star of the film. An incredibly silly time jumping adventure would be fun to watch even without MST3K comments. The experience is just endlessly enhanced with it. From the cartoonishly evil antagonist to the awkwardly shot action sequence, there's an endless stock of movie incompetence to make fun of here. 10. The last victim of Hands Down, this is my absolute favorite episode. It's one I can watch over and over again, and still double in laughter. First of all, the film is the cheesiest, the most Canadian occult thriller ever made. Secondly, of all, each character has a strange voice that you can't help but laugh at. There's a geeky child hero who has a million different ways to tell Rowsdower, the name closest to this movie to the hero. He also has a strange enthusiasm for the casual food he comes through in the booth. There's an old fugitive who sounds exactly like Yosemite Sam. The plot - a strange, ultimately meaningless tale about a child and a tramp running against a satanic cult. It also happens seven years later ... Teh Loans. There is only so much about this film that it doesn't make sense; The riffs are some of the best in the entire series. In addition, zap Rowsdower is still the best name of the action hero I've ever heard. 11. Soultaker The first episode of the final season marked the show's 10th anniversary by returning two favorite fan characters. The Love Satellite starts to malfunction, and there is a strange ship moving towards it. In between watching a movie (which is a surprisingly melodramatic supernatural horror movie), Joel and Frank TV make guest appearances. Turns out Joel kicked around Australia for a while after escaping with a satellite before ending up back in Minnesota. Since the companion of love is designed to break down after ten years, he returned to fix it. He doesn't save Mike and Boths because they're not just another season to complete; he doesn't want to deprive Mike of the formative experience that has been riffing on bad movies for years. Besides, he doesn't want to. It also makes a great joke about Crowe's voice sounding different. Trace Beaulieu, who played Dr. Forrester and Crowe in the early seasons, has long since left the show. Bill Corbett then took over Crowe's voice. The film is an incredibly cheesy story about teenagers who try to escape Soultakers, the death agents who chose them to die. Two of them end up in a coma in hospital, with their parents planning to take their life support at midnight. Their out-of-body perfumes should avoid Soultakers trying to collect them, and somehow convince their parents to keep them alive. One particularly funny thing that Mike and the bots pick up on is that the movie has no internal logic. Rules for souls are not consistent, sometimes you have to obey the laws of the physical world, and sometimes you don't. It's a funny episode overall, but the real draw here sees Joel return to the companion of love. 12. Squirm The Last Victim is the best episode of the Mike Squirm era, may be the second best. The film is like a tremor with regular-sized worms and none of the comedy. If that sounds like it's going to make for a horrible movie, you're absolutely right. The hero is a clumsy kind of natural from New York who constantly makes an ass about himself in this small southern town. What with these movies and trying to make awkward schlubs into action heroes? The film makes a big deal early on about how strange and inattentive it is for asking for egg cream in the south. It's a strange call, and it's never brought up again. The fact that this film is happening in the south is constantly shoved in the face, resulting in Tom Servo exclaiming: Nobody is that southern. The real draw of this episode is the short one that precedes the film. The case of spring fever is a strange little Jam Handy brief about the importance of sourcing in our daily lives. A man gets frustrated by having to fix things with springs in them and wishes he would never see spring again in his life. A cartoon sprite named Coily shows him a world without springs. Nothing works as intended and the person asks to source back into the world. It's a scary little short that makes you wonder why it was ever made in the first place. Curiously, a few references to Coily pop up throughout the series before bots ever saw the Case of Spring Fever. Specifically, they meet Wally Waffle Sprite in Season 3. The reason for this strange succession error is that the crew wanted to use short in the show from the beginning. They couldn't get the rights until last season. The honorable mention of the Creeping Eye-Saw episode (not counting the local Minnesota TV days) is worth watching just to see how it all started. The show still finds its voice, so the tone is more muted. Riffs don't come as often as in later episodes. However, this and the last episode serve as worthy bookends to the series. I blame my parents for a cautionary tale about a good child who didn't feel well, all because his parents didn't pay attention to him. This is one of the great episodes of the Joel era, with the moral panic of the era making for some hilarious comments at his expense. Mystery Science Theater 3000 Movie / This Island Land Is Technically not an episode, but theatrically released the film. Because of the focus-testing, Universal ordered it interrupted, so just over an hour, it's actually shorter than the standard episode. Mike and the bots take the opportunity to get a little bluer with their jokes, and this Island Earth may be the best movie in itself they've ever watched. Not that it says much. It's worth a look if you want to see what MST3K looks like given a bigger budget to work with. Mr. B's Lost Shorts This one isn't really an episode either. The shorts before the movies are some of the best segments in all of MST3K. This collection ensures that you see the most important ones. Originally, VHS tape was sent out to fan club members; this collection was included in the Volume 6 DVD set released by Rhino. You can probably also find all the shorts on YouTube. Mr. B Natural short requires viewing for any MST3K fan. Danger: Diabolic! The final episode of the original series launch. It's a wonderful ending to the series and a funny episode with a scary movie in its own right. You will appreciate the ending much more if you have seen the Creeping Eye.
